Lenten Activities

SOA

As we approach the Easter break the attention of our senior phase pupils turns towards the upcoming SQA exam diet. The latest updates from the SQA in relation to the 2023 diet is provided below.

SQA Appeals service 2023

Following extensive research with teachers, lecturers, parents, carers and learners, SQA have made some changes to the appeals service for 2023. This will bring it more in line with the service we had prior to the pandemic. Appeals 2023 will open on Results day – Tuesday 8 August. It will be a free service and available to all learners.

When an appeal is submitted, a senior SQA marker will review the assessments marked by SQA. Alternative assessment evidence will not be needed.

SQA Examination Exceptional Circumstances Consideration Service (EECCS) 2023

The EECCS, which involves the review of alternative evidence for candidates with exceptional circumstances, will remain in place.

The service will be available to learners who are unable to attend an exam and widened to include those whose performance in the examination may have been affected by a personal circumstance, or an unplanned incident on the day, which is beyond their control. This could be a medical condition or bereavement, or disruption on the day of the exam as reported by the Chief Invigilator.

SENIOR PHASE EXAM PREPARATION



As the SQA exam diet and study leave begins on **MONDAY, 24 APRIL 2023**, the following advice should help you support your child in their final exam preparations.

1 SQA EXAM TIMETABLE

It is important that pupils are clear about exactly when their SQA exams are in order to make sure they does not miss any of them and to help them structure their study planning. Information about exam times can be found on the SQA's website (http://www.sqa.org.uk/sqa/1439.74.html) and a personal exam timetable service (as a website feature or app) is available here too.

If a pupil is going to be late or absent for any exam then the School Office **must be contacted immediately**.

2 SQA EXAM RULES

It is important that pupils are clear about exactly how they should conduct themselves during their SQA exams to maximise their performance and prevent a paper being cancelled by breaching rules. A summary of the key things to consider can be seen below and more information about this can be found at http://www.sqa.org.uk/sqa/69124.html

GENERAL

- ✓ school uniform is to be worn when sitting exams
- ✓ arrive in good time (about 10 minutes before the exam starts) and check its location
- ✓ bring the right equipment (black/blue ink pens, pencils, etc) and your Scottish Candidate
 Number (SCN)
- ✓ check you have been given the correct exam paper
- ✓ complete all your details on every piece of work that you hand in
- ✓ read all instructions and listen carefully for additional instructions
- ✓ ensure you answer all sections and questions check you have not missed any out
- ✓ remember to cross out all rough work once you have made a final copy
- ✓ if you feel unwell, tell the Invigilator
- ✓ stay in the room until the exam is finished check over your answers if you have spare time

CONDUCT

- do not copy from someone else, or share your work with anyone else
- do not use offensive or frivolous language in your answers
- do not speak to any other pupil, behave disruptively or cause a disturbance in the exam room
- **x** do not share equipment with anyone else

Pupils must not have ANY of the following in the exam hall (or their paper will be cancelled)

- × Mobile phone
- Digital electronic device such as MP3 player, tablet or smartwatch
- Book, notes, sketches or paper
- Pencil case/calculator case
- Calculator or Dictionary except in specified subjects

SENIOR PHASE EXAM PREPARATION



3 TARGET SETTING

Pupils should use the information in their profile and any mentoring activities to identify the subjects that they should prioritise during study leave revision in order to address any development areas and so maximise their performance in the final SQA exam.

4 STUDY PLAN

Pupils should maximise the use of their study leave time between now and the exams by creating a plan of when they will revise and what topics and activities they plan to do during this revision time. To help pupils in doing this they can use a diary or the "My Study Plan" app from the SQA instead (http://www.sqa.org.uk/sqa/1439.74.html).

5 **EXAM LEAVE STUDY CLASSES**

All subjects have a revision session available during the exam leave time to allow pupils to meet with staff and go over any last minute concerns or questions. Please encourage your child to attend these sessions.

6 SQA SPECIMEN PAPER SERVICE

Pupils should ensure that they set aside a significant amount of study leave time to familiarise themselves with the structure, timing and content of their final exams by attempting and marking specimen paper questions. Free access to these papers and solutions in every subject can be found at the PAST PAPERS section of the SQA website. These can be (http://www.sqa.org.uk/pastpapers/findpastpaper.htm).

7 PARENTAL PARTNERSHIP

Our renewed Vision and Values are set out below.





S3 Health and Wellbeing Day

Recently, all S3 pupils enjoyed a day off timetable to participate in a series of workshops and activities aimed at understanding and improving their mental health.

In the morning, all pupils engaged in tasks in their groups that allowed them to analyse their own emotional, physical, mental and social wellbeing. After interval, pupils explored their understanding and awareness of anxiety and



potential triggers by taking part in active learning activities. After lunch all S3 pupils participated in a choice of sports in the PE department to boost their wellbeing.

This was an excellent opportunity for our young people to engage with activities that will help them identify potential issues and use strategies to help improve their own mental health. The feedback from pupils regarding the day has been very positive and we look forward to continuing with this work in improving all young people's mental health as part of our practice.







Mental Health Awareness Week

February 2023

Our S3 Wellbeing Day launched the beginning of Mental Health Awareness Week in Turnbull High School. A range of activities, lessons and presentations were planned across the week for everyone in school. Students and staff seemed to learn lots and enjoy the different tasks and activities on offer.

Students in S1 and S2 were issued with Let's Connect through Kindness Cards in response to 'you said/we did' feedback. Those young people who returned their Kindness Cards were rewarded by a random act of kindness when they least expected it, much to their delight.

Aiden, S5 Leader and S1 Leaders also interviewed staff about how they ensure they have good mental health. Our Leaders filmed staff giving their self-care tips and this was shared with the staff.

Emily, another S5 Leader, organised a Kindness Cafe for staff on the Friday of Mental Health Awareness Week. S1 Leaders were a huge help. Students and staff had a fabulous time.

At another stall, Modern Studies pupils were shown the best way to use flash cards to ensure success in the upcoming exams. Our Chemistry ambassador's signposted S4 students to use appropriate resources and websites while English focused on the best ways to analyse quotes and learn command words. Music ambassadors suggested the best times to study different elements of the course and helped with the literacy section such as time signatures.

Pupils were given time to converse with the older pupils for whom this was a recent experience and therefore made them the most appropriate to advice and counsel.


Thomas Muir Art Competition 2022



Just wanted to give everyone an update on the Reading School accreditation that we at Turnbull are trying to achieve.

So far we have created a Reading Group, made up of pupils, the Librarian (Mrs Wright), and myself (Mrs Jack).

Our focus is on encouraging others to read and making it appealing to reluctant readers.

As we all know, and many studies have proved, reading is a key ingredient in the academic success of pupils.

In order to demonstrate, and lead by example, teachers have been displaying 'I am currently reading' signs on their doors, including a note of their reading at the bottom of emails, we have a book swap trolley for all pupils, we have relaxing reading areas throughout the school. We regularly discuss our reading so that pupils can see and hear the joy it brings to us. Teachers are also offered the opportunity to read the latest teen fiction in order to increase their knowledge of what young people might like to read.

Recently, thanks to the Scottish Book Trust and also to Mr Addison and Mrs Travers, we visited Waterstones, in Sauchiehall Street, to purchase books. We took a group of pupils who chose the books themselves. After being given a 25% discount from Waterstones, we managed to bring over £430 worth of books back.

Teach the Teacher!


The tables were turned in Geography when S4 pupils became the teachers and Mr Hansen became the class!

Mr Hansen missed four periods of the Rural topic so to get him back to up to speed the class designed and delivered a recap lesson. One of our BLP themes, Active Participation, was in full flow as S4 pupils deliberated over the types of activities they wanted to include. The starter task consisted of countdown conundrums followed by some impressive acting skills during a charade game. The main task saw Mr Hansen matching sample answer statements with the correct sketched image. To his surprise, there was then a homework activity to complete and submit the next day.

Mr Hansen's final report made for mixed reading, his working grade didn't meet the classes target grade expectations and comments included 'enthusiastic pupil but answers back too much', 'excellent acting skills, should consider Drama instead of Geography'. Ouch.









HISTORY DEPARTMENT

1HM Bannockburn

It was pupils from 1HM who had the opportunity to visit the Bannockburn Experience this time. Pupils had an excellent time with some interactive learning experiences witnessing a digitally re-created version of the battle, up close. Pupils also had the excellent opportunity to try on and handle replica armour and weapons and learn about the types of soldier that would have been present at the battle. This visit gave pupils a real



insight into the behind the scenes of the Battle of Bannockburn and they fully immersed themselves. Although the sun wasn't shining we had great weather that day and even managed to have a walk around and admire the views from the impressive monument!





S2 Jewish Archive Trip

Each S2 class had the pleasure of going to the Jewish Archive Centre at Garnethill Synagogue across January and February. As a Vision School, Turnbull High is dedicated to Holocaust education and S2 are currently learning all about the horrors of the Holocaust and the impact it had. The trip allowed S2 not only to see the incredibly beautiful synagogue that resides here in Glasgow but also gave them the opportunity to learn more about the Jewish faith to better their understanding of the true loss experienced by people of Jewish faith during this dark period of History. They also got the opportunity to learn about Kindertransport and how some of the Jewish children that fled made a life and a home right here in Glasgow.









MODERN STUDIES DEPARTMENT

Advanced Higher Modern Studies Glasgow Sheriff Court

Our Advanced Higher Modern Studies class got the opportunity to visit Glasgow's Sheriff Court in January of this year. We managed to interview multiple lawyers and Sheriff Wood of Glasgow's Drug Court. We were able to ask about the effectiveness of our Scottish Prison System and the extent of rehabilitation which is offered. To further consolidate our understanding of the court process we viewed multiple trials and sentencing first hand. One of my personal favourite parts of the day was visiting the Drug Court and watching those who had been receiving drug treatment then graduate, sober, from their programmes. Clearly, seeing the successes of others was a large motivator for those who were currently in the treatment process (many stated this when speaking to the Sheriff) and proved that not all hope in lost. Overall, the day was super informative and furthered my interest in Law and Order as a whole.




Physics Pupil awarded "Excellence in Physics" for Outstanding Exam

Performance

Congratulations to Anna H, who has been awarded an "Excellence in Physics" Award from the National Institute of Physics (IOP) for attaining the equal highest mark in the 2022 National 5 Physics Award.

In 2022, 13,320 pupils sat the Physics National 5 exam in Scotland. It is a significant achievement to come top in a national exam and the Physics Department, Anna's fellow Physics students and the wider





school community were delighted by Anna's success.

A party was required! Cakes, juice and music were assembled and Anna celebrated with her fellow Physicists.

During the party, the certificate was presented to Anna by Head Teacher, Mrs Kennedy.

SCIENCE: STEM

STEM Science, Technology,

Industrial Cadets Bronze Award

Our STEM Club developed key skills for learning, life and work by taking part in the Industrial Cadets Bronze Award. This challenge ran from November to January and is designed to help learn about the exciting STEM opportunities available to our young people.

Working with our industry mentor from Aggreko, the Turnbull High School team of S2 pupils investigated how to improve the sustainability of the Burj Kalifa in Dubai. They wrote a full scientific report, built a scale model of the Burj Kalifa and tested it against extreme weather events, which could be caused by climate change. Finally, we travelled to Merchant's House in Glasgow to present our findings to a panel of industry experts.

The Bronze Award they have completed enhances the work students complete in their academic education. At the end of the project, our students graduated as Bronze-level Industrial Cadets, a nationally recognised award that students can use as evidence of their experience and take forward to complement their future career journeys.







CELEBRATING MUSICAL CULTURE AT TURNBULL HIGH SCHOOL

On January 2023 there were trips for S1 and S2 pupils to visit Glasgow Royal Concert Hall to participate in a live musical performance as part of a huge audience at the world-renowned Celtic Connections Festival. S1 and S2 were joined by several of our pupils who study



Music in school, and members of our school bands.

These trips were an opportunity for our young people to learn more about culture – with a focus on Traditional language, music, song and dance and give pupils an opportunity to experience this culture first-hand. This has enabled pupils to extend their knowledge of music from Scotland and across the globe.

Performances Turnbull High School pupils participated in as part of the audience were:

Le Vent du Nord

The award-winning **Le Vent du Nord** lead the way in Québec's exciting and progressive Francophone folk movement. The group's vast repertoire draws from both traditional sources and original compositions. Their rhythmic and soulful music, rooted in the Celtic diaspora, is enhanced with a broad range of global influences. They had teachers and pupils dancing in the aisles!

St Roch's Ceili Band

St Roch's Ceili Band are a group of 14-18 year olds from the Glasgow area. They performed a selection of tunes and songs that incorporate the variety of instruments and wonderful talents they share. Between them, this group boasts numerous Scottish and British titles from competing at Fleadh Cheoil, in both solo and group competitions. These young people are extremely talented traditional musicians, and included some of our present and former Turnbull High School pupils. What a show they put on!

Session A9

Scottish super group **Session A9** features the stunning fiddles of Charlie McKerron, Gordon Gunn, Kevin Henderson and Adam Sutherland . Brian McAlpine is on piano, Marc Clement on guitar and vocals and David Robertson on percussion. They performed sizzling arrangements, played with skill, fire and enthusiasm – and even gave Turnbull High School pupils a wee mention from the stage!

Strands

Strands is a celebration of Celtic Connections' pioneering education programme. Young musicians came together from regions across Scotland to showcase their home traditions. They then première a brand-new ensemble composition from Treacherous Orchestra co-founder John Somerville. Since 1999, over 200,000 children and young people have taken part in Celtic Connections events. The learning continued at this event, with around 30 young musicians performing on stage and inspiring a young audience.

We then saw the Scottish group Session A9 which featured fiddles, piano, guitar, percussion and a singer.


