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Promoting Positive Behaviour

In addition to the special award ceremonies within the BGE, Senior Phase and in the field of sporting achievement, Turnbull High School promotes and recognises positive behaviour and work ethic through our Aiming High and Aiming Higher certificates.

Aiming High (S1-S3) and Aiming Higher (S4-S6) certificates are awarded to pupils demonstrating high standards of behaviour, work ethic, homework, attendance and punctuality. The criteria for this is provided on Page 6.

Please note that these awards are not based on academic ability. All pupils are capable of achieving these awards. Medical information impacting on attendance will be taken into account.

Please encourage your child to work towards these goals. All pupils will be invited to participate in the awards assemblies where these achievements are recognised.

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Parking at the School Gate

In the interests of safety parents should not park on the zigzag lines outside the school, stop at areas marked no parking or stop their car in the middle of the road causing inconvenience to others. Parents may find it easier to meet their children a short distance from the school to help minimise congestion in the surrounding area.

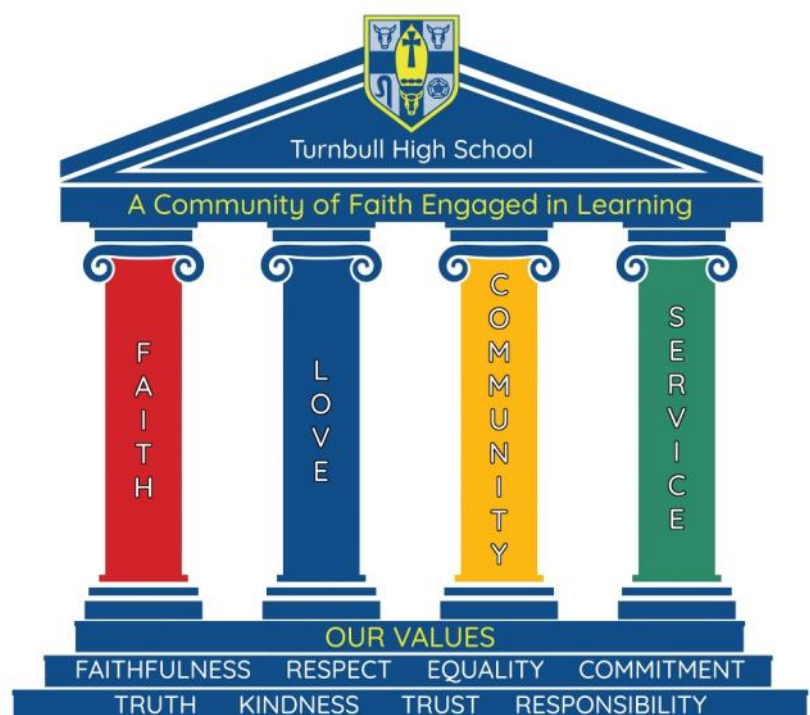

Allergies – Anaphylactic Shock

Many of our young people suffer from a range of allergies. Whilst it is not possible to give a guarantee that the school environment will be completely allergen free, we do request that young people do not bring nuts or food stuffs containing nuts into school. Please help us ensure that Turnbull High is a nut free zone.

Each young person affected by severe allergies must carry an inhaler, Piriton and Epipen with him/her at ALL times as appropriate. This is especially important should the young person be going out of school to attend an event or go on a trip. Medication required to combat allergic reactions and anaphylaxis should NOT be stored in the school office (unless a spare) or left with office staff.

Parents/Carers must ensure that their child comes to school with the correct medication in date, clearly labelled and with their son/daughter's name on it.

Parents/Carers should inform the PT Pastoral Care and School Nurse of any changes in medication as soon as this happens.

ATTENDANCE

Every School Day Counts

In this edition of the Turnbull Times, we are revisiting the importance of attendance at school in supporting every young person's wellbeing, learning and options for the future. We all have responsibilities to ensure that young people achieve their full potential in life. The 1980 Education Act (Scotland) (Section 30) lays a duty on every parent of a child of 'school age' to ensure that their child attends school regularly.

If your son or daughter is experiencing difficulties attending school, the sooner you inform us of this, the quicker we can work together to remedy this.

Every School Day Counts: Parents and Carers

Attendance Advice for Parents and Carers

- Make sure your son/daughter attends every day. Every missed day is a day without teacher input and expertise. It is a fact that greater attendance equals greater attainment. If your child misses one day of school a week, this becomes a year missed over the course of five years. Every day counts!
- Excellent punctuality is essential and expected. The school day begins at 9am prompt and all students are expected to arrive in good time for school starting.
- Time management – arriving on time for the start of school and throughout the school day for each new lesson is crucial to achieving full academic potential and skills for life.
- Attendance and punctuality are important aspects of the references we provide for employers, further and higher education.

We ask that parents and carers support us by:

- ◆ Ensuring a good sleep habit/readiness for school routine
- ◆ Getting your son/daughter up in plenty of time to eat breakfast, be ready and prepared for school
- ◆ Helping your son/daughter to be organised for the day by preparing school bags, equipment and kit the evening before
- ◆ Making sure you leave in plenty of time to manage traffic and congestion if dropping your son/daughter at school
- ◆ Telephoning your son/daughter to make sure they are ready to leave on time if you leave the house before them
- ◆ Making every effort for appointments to be made outwith the school day
- ◆ Making every effort for holidays to be taken outwith school term¹
- ◆ Monitoring your son/daughter's punctuality and attendance for patterns
- ◆ Tell us in advance of absence or latecoming if you can.

¹EDC policy - Family holidays are regarded as authorised absence where prior agreement from the school has been obtained and where it is judged the holiday is important to the wellbeing and cohesion of the family, following serious or terminal illness, bereavement or other traumatic events.

Every School Day Counts: School

If your child is late, you will receive a text message from the school advising of this. We will also contact you if your child is absent and we have not had any communication about this from you. This will involve contacting you and, where necessary, your emergency contact person(s).

If these actions are not successful, the school will ask our Attendance Officer to visit your home on the day of absence. In some exceptional circumstances, where the school believes your child could be at risk of harm, contact will be made with the Police and/or Social Work.

If you are unaware of your child's absence, you should contact the school immediately.

Attendance Concerns

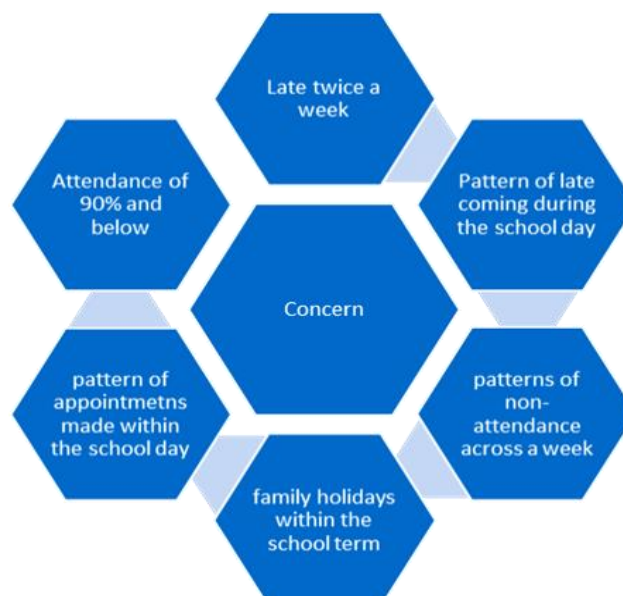
Where there are concerns about punctuality and/or patterns of non-attendance, your child's PT Pastoral Care will be proactive in discussing these with you. If we have concerns, we will:

- Speak to your child about this
- Telephone you to discuss this concern and agree what needs to be done to improve this
- We will set a timescale within which punctuality and/or attendance should improve
- We will monitor this and contact you again to review progress
- We will support your child in school with this.

If no improvement, we will:

- Telephone you to discuss the reasons behind this
- Agree supports, actions and timescales for punctuality/attendance to improve and send the school's Attendance Officer to visit you at home as required
- Send you a letter of concern and invite you into school to discuss
- At the meeting, agree a timescale for supports, actions and timescales for punctuality/attendance to improve
- Refer our concerns on to the school's Attendance Council
- Refer on to other agencies for support.

Summary

Our partnership with you is even more important than ever. Please do not wait to raise any concerns about your child's attendance, learning or wellbeing with us. We understand that some young people have 'off days' but it is important to keep a positive attendance going. This builds resilience and progression in learning.

We will celebrate your child's positive school attendance and work with you to make good attendance, good punctuality and good learning habits a skill for life.

The damaging effect of poor attendance on a young person's learning and wellbeing can be seen below.

Percentage	Number of Days a year	Commentary
100% Attendance	0 Days missed	Gives your child the best chance of success and ensuring their full potential is achieved.
95% Attendance	9 days of absence 1 week and 4 days learning missed	Makes it harder to achieve full potential and secure the best possible outcomes.
90% Attendance MINIMUM EXPECTED	19 days of absence 3 weeks and 4 days of learning missed	Learner confidence starts to drop.
85% Attendance	27 days of absence 5 weeks and 3 days of learning missed = almost half a term missed	Impacts significantly on learning and progress which can lead to poorer outcomes in achievement, wellbeing and social and emotional development. Negatives: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Poor self esteem • Worries about keeping up • Pressure of time
80% Attendance	36 days of absence 7 weeks and 3 days of learning missed.	
75% Attendance	45 days of absence 9 weeks and 1 day of learning missed Almost 1 whole term missed	

If a child has 90% attendance, they will have the equivalent of

- **½ a day off per week**
- **18 days off per year**
- **247 days off over their school career of 12 academic years, equivalent to over 1 year of lost education.**

Participation in School Reward Trips

Pupil Participation

Turnbull High School policy requires that any pupil representing the school or participating in reward trips has demonstrated the high standards of attendance, punctuality and behaviour that merit participation in such events.

Whilst there is always the flexibility to consider requests on an individual basis, pupils participating in extra curricular activities should meet the following criteria:

✓	Attendance greater than 90%
✓	Late coming less than 5%
✓	Aiming High/Aiming Higher award winner*

The following criteria would exclude a pupil from participating in extra curricular activities (determined on a termly basis):

✗	Monitoring Booklet with SMT
✗	Exclusion

*Our criteria for Aiming High/Aiming Higher awards are as follows:

GOLD	95% attendance, late less than 5%, <i>Reflective Exercise <5, no 3s or 4s in tracking ratings</i>
SILVER	95% attendance, late less than 5%, <i>Reflective Exercise <5, no 4s and no more than one 3 in tracking ratings</i>
BRONZE	90% attendance, late less than 5%, <i>Reflective Exercise <5 no 4s and no more than two 3s in tracking ratings</i>

Aiming High/Aiming Higher criteria are not related to academic performance.

Turnbull High School promotes and recognises good attendance, punctuality, behaviour, homework and effort through our Aiming High (S1 to S3) and Aiming Higher (S4 to S6) schemes. These criteria were established in session 2016/17 following consultation with pupils, parents and staff.

Our Engaged, Respectful, Safe poster summarises the standards expected of all members of the school community and is displayed in every classroom across the school.

UNIFORM POLICY :

DRESS FOR SUCCESS

Our dress code aims to provide a cost-effective way for pupils to show that they are proud to belong to our school community. Wearing uniform reflects a positive attitude to learning and removes any peer pressure to wear expensive brand names. Wearing uniform also promotes equality and inclusion. We continue to expect the highest possible standards for our Turnbull school uniform.

BLAZER

The school blazer complete with embroidered badge is compulsory for ALL pupils. There are two styles of blazer available, fitted or traditional design, for both boys and girls.

Plain black jackets, **no logos or colours**, may be worn over the blazer and removed upon arrival at school.

SCHOOL SHIRTS/BLOUSES

Only blue school shirts/ blouses that can be fastened to the top are acceptable. These should be traditional school wear clothing.

PE KIT

Plain T- shirt or Turnbull PE top must be worn with shorts / plain sportswear trousers. Leggings are allowed for girls.

Neutral colours are fine it need not be black.

However, colour can be worn if it is a Turnbull PE top that has been purchased via the PE Department. These tops are £10 each and come in a vast range of colours. Please note: they are not available from Baru.

Additional uniform items available for PE kit include a technical fabric top and a hooded sweatshirt for outside use.

Vest/ low cut tops are NOT acceptable. Proper training shoes that support and protect feet should be worn

Other Information:

The wearing of jewellery should be kept to a minimum as it can be a Health and Safety risk. Make up should be minimal in keeping with the formal standards of the school. Hair accessories should be black.

We appreciate that this information is prescriptive. This is to ensure that there is no ambiguity as to what is acceptable with regard to school uniform. The school supplier, Baru, provides a very cost effective package for our school.

Uniform may also be purchased from reputable stores, or supermarkets which also provide an appropriate range of school wear. High Street fashion retailers do not provide appropriate Turnbull High school uniform. If you are in any doubt please contact the school before purchasing.

Our new Community Hub offers recycled uniform items to support all pupils in wearing full school uniform every day. Pupils should go to the Community Hub between 8.45am and 9am to collect required items - stationery, toiletries etc are also available free of charge.

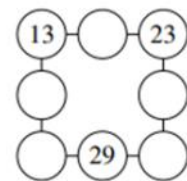

Higher Level Numeracy

For the first time, Turnbull's Maths Department offered our S4 to S6 pupils the chance to complete an intensive course to gain a Higher Level Numeracy qualification. This qualification is awarded automatically to any pupil gaining a Higher Maths award but many of senior pupils do not sit Higher Maths and therefore do not gain this qualification. It can, however, be awarded by successfully completing a series of assessments.

The qualification allows pupils to demonstrate their high level of skill in Money, Time and Measurement; Number Processes and Information Handling. They also have to be able to Apply, Analyse and Evaluate in order to pass.

15 of our senior pupils volunteered to give up their time, after their exams had been completed and before their return to school, in order to gain this useful qualification. Congratulations to all the 15 pupils who were successful in gaining this award and thank you to Miss Young and Mrs Nolan for their hard work in assisting the pupils through this.

UK National Space Academy Space Advocate

Mr de Sainte Croix - Teacher of Physics, Science, STEM and Numeracy has been successful in becoming a **Space Advocate** for the UK National Space Academy.

This is a 30-day secondment over 2 years delivering space-themed "masterclasses" across Scotland.

Mr de Sainte Croix will be one of a small number of Science Teachers from across the UK to become a Space Advocate. In this role Mr de Sainte Croix will deliver masterclasses, with a heavy focus on physics, to schools across Scotland. Masterclasses highlight the science, scope and possibilities within the UK space industry. Thankfully, Mr de Sainte Croix will still be a Turnbull Teacher, as the Space Advocate role is only for a limited number of days per year.

Turnbull pupils and staff will benefit as well. There will be an investment provided to Turnbull High School to support the role, invest in related items and provide training to the Physics and wider Science Departments. **The aim is for Turnbull High School to become a leading school in the promotion of space science, careers and opportunities within Scotland.**

Equipment provided for the masterclasses will also be available to use within Turnbull. This includes an infrared camera, high altitude flight helmets and compressed air rocket launchers.

As part of the two year program, approximately 50% of pupils within Turnbull will be given the opportunity to participate in a masterclass delivered by the Space Advocate and their science teaching colleagues.
