Mid Term Holiday


School will close for the students at 3.45pm on Thursday 12th October. School will reopen on Monday 23rd October at 9:00am.


TURNBULL HIGH SCHOOL SCHOOL MISSION - OCTOBER 2023

BLESSED CARLO ACUTIS AND THE EUCHARIST

We were delighted to welcome our Mission team to Turnbull High School from 4th to 9th October 2023.

During the Mission, our school community learned more about the life of Carlo Acutis and his devotion to the holy Eucharist.

Studying the example of Blessed Carlo tied together many aspects of our recent journey as a community of faith engaged in learning. Carlo's Faith and Love shone



through Service and his investment in the Community of those around him and those he reached online.

In our School Prayer of Consecration, we promised to deepen our devotion for the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist and to pray the Rosary. Carlo gave our young people an example of how a 15 year old boy can fully embrace these ideals and live them out in their lives.

WHAT TOOK PLACE

- 1. Pupils learned about *Blessed Carlo Acutis and the Eucharist* in RE lessons.
- 2. Opening Mass took place Wednesday 4th October at 8.30 am led by our Chaplain Fr Alex Mpaggi.
- 3. Rosary took place before school on Thursday 5th October and Friday 6th October.
- 4. All learners visited the exhibition on *Blessed Carlo Acutis and the Eucharist* in the Assembly Hall and prayers in the Oratory.
- 5. The exhibition was opened at lunchtimes too, for pupils and staff to drop in.
- 6. There will be a session for staff on *Blessed Carlo Acutis and the Eucharist* at the Staff Service on a future inset day.
- 7. Our associated primaries were invited to attend too, and we look forward to sharing our experiences with them.
- 8. There was a final Mass to close the Mission at 2.30 pm on Monday 9th October.

10 FACTS ABOUT CARLO ACUTIS (Source: Catholic News Agency)

Carlo Acutis, a Catholic Italian teenager who died in 2006, was beatified Oct. 10, 2020 in Assisi. *Acutis, a gamer and computer programmer who loved soccer and the Eucharist, gained interest around the world.*



So who was Carlo Acutis? Here's what you need to know:

- 1. Carlo Acutis was born May 3, 1991, in London, where his parents were working. Just a few months later, his parents, Andrea Acutis and Antonia Salzano, moved to Milan.
- 2. As a teenager, Carlo was diagnosed with leukemia. He offered his sufferings for Pope Benedict XVI and for the Church, saying ""I offer all the suffering I will have to suffer for the Lord, for the Pope, and the Church."
- 3. He died on Oct. 12, 2006, and was buried in Assisi, at his request, because of his love for St. Francis of Assisi. His cause for canonisation began in 2013. He was designated "Venerable" in 2018, and was designated "Blessed" October 10, 2020.
- 4. From a young age, Carlo seemed to have a special love for God, even though his parents weren't especially devout. His mum said that before Carlo, she went to Mass only for her First Communion, her Confirmation, and her wedding. But as a young child, Carlo loved to pray the rosary. After he made his First Communion, he went to Mass as often as he could, and he made Holy Hours before or after Mass. He went to confession weekly. He asked his parents to take him on pilgrimages to the places of the saints, and to the sites of Eucharistic miracles.
- 5. His witness of faith led to a deep conversion in his mum, because, according to the priest promoting his cause for sainthood, he "managed to drag his relatives, his parents to Mass every day. It was not the other way around; it was not his parents bringing the little boy to Mass, but it was he who managed to get himself to Mass and to convince others to receive Communion daily."
- 6. He was known for defending others at school who got picked on, especially those with disabilities. When a friend's parents were getting a divorce, Carlo made a special effort to include his friend in the Acutis family life.
- 7. He was also a programmer, and built a website cataloguing and promoting Eucharistic miracles. On the site, he told people that "the more often we receive the Eucharist, the more we will become like Jesus, so that on this earth we will have a foretaste of heaven."
- 8. Carlo loved playing video games. His console of choice was a Playstation. We know he only allowed himself to play games for an hour a week, as a penance and a spiritual discipline, but he wanted to play much more.
- 9. Initially, there were reports that the body of Carlo Acutis was found to be incorrupt. A spokeswoman for Acutis' beatification told CNA that the entire body was present when it was exhumed, but "not incorrupt." He, however, lied in repose in a glass tomb where he was venerated by pilgrims until Oct. 17, 2020. He was displayed in jeans and a pair of Nikes, the casual clothes he preferred in life.

His heart, which can now be considered a relic, is displayed in a reliquary in the Basilica of St. Francis in Assisi. His mother said that his family had wanted to donate his organs when he died, but were unable to do so because of the leukemia.

This year, my group won a competition called YPI. This is the Youth and Philanthropy Initiative, set up by The Wood Foundation. Through partnership, this competition helped us raise £3,000 for a charity called The Glasgow Association for Mental Health (GAMH), where we went up against 5 groups to compete for our charity. We were fortunate to win this huge funding boost for GAMH.

We chose this charity because many young teens and adults experience mental health issues, and they don't talk to anyone about it, but this charity will help them relieve their feelings. Approximately one in four people in the UK will experience a mental health problem each year.

GAMH is found near Springburn Road in the North of Glasgow. The charity helps people with mental health issues when they need it most. They do so many activities to help people be happy and relaxed. For example, they have a community garden which helps them not only learn but also help them keep calm and relaxed. They also have a one-to-one team which helps people get out in the community. They have group teams which help people meet other people and help them get out, they might have the same thing in common or just problems in general.

All these things just support people who are really struggling with their mental health and gives them a place where they can meet people and get a bit of relief from worry.

This was an opportunity I didn't take lightly; it means a lot to our team.



What our Senior BLP Ambassadors are saying:

Being part of BLP has helped me work on not just my teamwork skills but working independently to build towards a shared vision for our school. During my time as a building learning ambassador, I have delivered lessons to younger pupils in the school, making them aware of methods and approaches on how to study successfully to achieve their goals. This includes methods of 3B4ME or mind maps. As a team we come up with new ideas that can be interesting for younger learners so they are excited and ready to learn every time they enter the classroom and leave achieving their best and feel productive in their learning. We have made TikTok that help young people understand ways to better their learning for themselves and feel encouraged to take part with us. I feel being part of Building Learning Power has encouraged me to use these tips and tricks for myself and improve my own studying over the years. It has built on my confidence and people skills which are both qualities that are highly valued in the world of work.

Participating in the Building Learning Power group has been an inspiring and valuable experience. I have acquired positive experiences and skills during my involvement in this group. BLP has created a collaborative environment where individuals come together to learn and develop new skills, centred around a shared goal to enhance learner power throughout the school. Through active participation, I have gained valuable insights and abilities that have not only enhanced my personal growth but also have importance in various aspects of my life moving forward. One of the most positive aspects of being part of the group is the opportunity for collaborative learning which has promoted creativity and innovation. Participating in group discussions and shared activities has improved my communication skills significantly. I have learned how to express my ideas clearly, actively listen to others, and provide constructive feedback. Working on group projects has enhanced my ability to work together effectively with others. Balancing group activities with other commitments has taught me valuable time management skills. I have become more adept at prioritizing tasks and meeting deadlines. While participating in group activities, I had opportunities to take on leadership roles. This experience has allowed me to develop leadership skills such as decision-making, delegation, and motivating team members. Across the board, participation in this team has been an extremely beneficial and enjoyable experience.

I really enjoyed being a BLP ambassador because I had a chance to improve my communication skills by presenting Building Learning Power information in front of the S1 pupils at assembly and during PSE. I think that being able to talk to a wide range of students in different year groups about BLP was beneficial for me as it gave me the opportunity to see the world through different eyes. I would recommend becoming a BLP ambassador as although talking in front of others can be scary it is an amazing experience and opportunity to better yourself. BLP has taught me a lot of things like how to become more independent. I feel more comfortable and confident doing work on my own, asking a teacher for help has now become a last resort and I really feel like an active participant in my learning.

BLP has helped me become a better all-round leaner, it has taught me skills in which I will use in further education and my future life outside school. It has enhanced my communication skills as it has given me the opportunities to talk in front of BGE in assembly and in class, with doing this it has also helped my confidence grow. As well, BLP has allowed many chances for independent learning and from this we came up with the idea of a TikTok account to help interact with the wider community. Overall BLP has been a worthwhile experience which I have learnt a lot from and will continue to use and promote throughout learning.

BLP has really improved my overall learning, it has helped me realise that not everyone learns the same way and different ways of learning suit other people better. Being a BLP ambassador has given me an opportunity to be a school leader and given me leadership opportunities within the school, helping me boost my confidence as we have given lessons to younger pupils. We prepared and delivered these lessons as a group and this taught us valuable skills such as public speaking and teamwork. Overall BLP has massively improved my school experience and I have thoroughly enjoyed being a part of this group in the past few years.

Throughout my time being a BLP ambassador, I have learned and taught skills that I use throughout my everyday learning and will take onto my further education. These skills allow for me to learn for myself making my learning more effective for success. Alongside the other ambassadors, I have taught these skills to BGE pupils and created a TikTok to inspire pupils to use these techniques. These are life skills that we are leaning at a young age and creating leadership opportunities further expanding our knowledge and skills.

I have thoroughly enjoyed my time as a BLP ambassador. It has been a life lesson that I have taken with me to help expand and develop my learning ability as it has taught me how to effectively learn by myself. As a BLP ambassador, I have been able to build my confidence by talking in a crowd as I've delivered lessons and assemblies.

I would say that BLP helped me become far more independent in my learning, as well as confident through the techniques as well as strategies used in my learning. Furthermore, I was able to socialise and have fun with a variety of year groups which I wouldn't have had the excuse to do so outside of the ambassadors committee. This made me look forward to going to the BLP meetings as I knew I would have a great time when I got there. I think BLP should be a thing in every school.

By participating in BLP I feel like I have grown as a person by achieving a clearer and more in depth understanding of how different learning styles impact the way we are taught. After becoming involved with preaching the importance of taking responsibility for your own learning style to younger years before embarking on their exam journey, has became evident to me that using different strategies not only benefits students in their academic life but also in the development of their self confidence and comprehension abilities.

Throughout being a BLP Ambassador, we have gained many skills and experiences that can help us later in life in the world of work. From the planning to the presenting to the younger years of our school, we have gained confidence in multiple areas. Firstly, the planning of our presentation helped us develop skills such as organisational skills, communication skills and literacy skills. Afterwards, we successfully presented our hard work to the first years during an assembly and class time. In class we taught a lesson on Building Learning Power and how it is important in this school to have independence in our learning. We gave them different ways that they can learn and develop their own knowledge without needing the help of a teacher. As for the assembly, we gained confidence in talking to large groups of individuals and accomplished getting over that fear which can also help us in our future. Throughout this experience, we have also learned different ways in which we can learn about different subjects easily. Building Learning Power is all about having independence in your own learning and we have gained knowledge on how to do this ourselves. This has helped us prepare for our exams, we have been able to revise independently and it has taught us that we don't need a helping hand at all times.

NEWS FROM THE FLEADH IN MULLINGAR, IRELAND

7 IS THE MAGIC NUMBER FOR TURNBULL'S TALENTED MUSICIAN ORLA!

A Fleadh is a festival of Irish music, dancing and culture.

Each year, throughout Ireland and Great Britain, as well as many other countries as far afield as USA and Japan, musicians compete in Fleadhs with the aim of qualifying to compete at the Fleadh Cheoil na hÉireann (All Ireland Fleadh) which is the Olympics of Irish Traditional Music.

Musicians throughout Scotland competed at the Scottish Fleadh In April 2023 and those who are placed 1st to 3rd at that qualify to compete at the British Fleadh. I played in seven competitions, they were: piano accordion, piano, accompaniment, duet, trio, ceili band and grupa ceoil (Irish for musical group). I came first in all of these competitions so went through to the British Fleadh which took place in June 2023.

Those who are placed 1st and 2nd at the British Fleadh qualifies to compete at the All-Ireland Fleadh in August 2023. I came first in all seven competitions again.

The All Ireland Fleadh took place in Mullingar in Ireland and was attended by more than half a million people from all around the world. I took part in seven

competitions; my duet and trio competitions were broadcast live on Fleadh TV.

I was delighted to have the opportunity to compete at such a prestigious event and was thrilled to be placed third in the under 15 piano accordion competition. The standard is so incredibly high so winning this was a huge achievement.

TURNBULL HIGH SCHOOL HAS A CHESS CHAMPION!

Kanishka from S2 in Turnbull High School has been playing chess since the tender age of six, and now competes at the very highest level for her age group!

She has been the Scottish Girls Champion for the last two years and has represented Scotland at various world tournaments - Fide World Cadet Chess Championships 2022 in Georgia, and WR Chess Juniors in Dusseldorf, Germany. She has also played in the British Championships. The tournament held in Germany also gave Kanishka an opportunity to meet some of the world's elite chess players like Ian Nepomniachtchi and Anish Giri to name a few.

Recently Kanishka played at the Glorney Chess Festival, which took place at Stirling University in August 2023. It was an International event having teams from England, Scotland, Ireland and Wales. There were teams participating from each of the four countries participating in the Glorney Cup, Gilbert Cup, Stokes Cup and Robinson Cup. It was a very exciting event and Kanishka was honoured to be part of this.

Team Scotland won the Glorney Cup after 58 years and Kanishka received the prestigious Top Girl Player of the Year Award.
