



School will re-open to pupils on Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> August at 9am.



# TURNBULL HIGH SCHOOL UNIFORM POLICY : DRESS FOR SUCCESS

Our dress code aims to provide a cost-effective way for pupils to show that they are proud to belong to our school community. Wearing uniform reflects a positive attitude to learning and removes any peer pressure to wear expensive brand names. Wearing uniform also promotes equality and inclusion. We continue to expect the highest possible standards for our Turnbull school uniform.

#### BLAZER

The school blazer complete with embroidered badge is compulsory for ALL pupils. There are two styles of blazer available, fitted or traditional design, for both boys and girls.

Plain black jackets, no logos or colours, may be worn over the blazer and removed upon arrival at school.

#### SCHOOL SHIRTS/BLOUSES

Only blue school shirts/ blouses that can be fastened to the top are acceptable. These should be traditional school wear clothing.

### UNIFORM POLICY : DRESS FOR SUCCESS

#### CARDIGANS/JUMPERS

- ✓ Black school cardigans must be fitted and be of an appropriate length
- Long cardigans and tank tops NOT acceptable
- crew neck jumpers and hoodies are NOT acceptable
- Only plain black V- neck jumpers must be worn

#### TIGHTS/SOCKS

Black tights should be worn. They should be plain without any pattern. Black knee high socks and short socks must be plain.

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#### FOOTWEAR

 Black, formal school shoes or plain black trainers which appear similar to school shoes must be worn.

Black boots must be robust and in keeping with the formal dress code

ALL other types of fashion footwear are **NOT** acceptable eg Converse etc

#### PE KIT

~

Plain T- shirt or Turnbull PE top must be worn with shorts / plain sportswear trousers. Leggings are allowed for girls.

Neutral colours are fine it need not be black.

However, colour can be worn if it is a Turnbull PE top that has been purchased via the PE Department. These tops are £10 each and come in a vast range of colours. Please note: they are not available from Baru.

Additional uniform items available for PE kit include a technical fabric top and a hooded sweatshirt for outside use.

Vest/ low cut tops are NOT acceptable. Proper training shoes that support and protect feet should be worn

#### **Other Information:**

The wearing of jewellery should be kept to a minimum as it can be a Health and Safety risk. Make up should be minimal in keeping with the formal standards of the school. Hair accessories should be black.

We appreciate that this information is prescriptive. This is to ensure that there is no ambiguity as to what is acceptable with regard to school uniform. The school supplier, Baru, provides a very cost effective package for our school.

Uniform may also be purchased from reputable stores, or supermarkets which also provide an appropriate range of school wear. High Street fashion retailers do not provide appropriate Turnbull High school uniform. If you are in any doubt please contact the school before purchasing.

## Cost of the School Day

Whether you have an S1 or S6, the costs associated with school can mount up. Yet many working parents are missing out on £1,000s of easy help.

Here are a few areas where parents and young people can receive support.

#### **Clothing Grant**

Parents/carers have a responsibility to ensure that their children have adequate footwear and clothing to take full advantage of the education provided at school. East Dunbartonshire Council will assist parents/carers in meeting this responsibility by providing a grant to enable parents/carers to purchase appropriate school clothing for their children. The current grant is at least £100 per child per school year, which will be paid by cheque. Clothing grant payments will normally be paid to parents/carers who are in receipt of Income Support or Income Based Job Seekers Allowance or Housing Benefit or Council Tax Reduction (Not Discount) or **Employment and Support Allowance (Income** Related) Universal Credit or Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999 or Working Tax Credit and/or Child Tax Credit. Any other claims will only be considered in exceptional circumstances. #### **Free School Meals**

Since 5th January 2015, all P1-P3 pupils are entitled to a Free School Meal.

In addition, Free School Meals will be granted to all other pupils whose parents/carers are in receipt of either Income Support or Income Based Job Seekers Allowance or Child Tax Credit or Working Tax Credit and Child Tax Credit or Employment and Support Allowance (Income Related) or Universal Credit or Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999. Pupils are eligible to apply for free school meals in their own right if they are aged 16 to 18, and receive one of these benefits. Payments are uploaded to the Cashless Catering system on a daily basis so there is anonymity for free school lunch pupils but allows top ups for other purchases. #### **Education Maintenance Allowance (EMA)**

Education Maintenance Allowances (EMAs) provide financial support to eligible 16 to 19 year olds who want to continue learning.

To be eligible, you have to meet the following criteria:

#### Residency

You need to have what's known as 'ordinary residence' to be eligible for EMA.

Ordinary residence means you live in one place, but there is a complicated set of rules that decide whether you're ordinarily resident in Scotland, with different arrangements in place for different immigration statuses.

Contact your local authority or bursary office for more information on whether you're eligible.

#### **Household income**

Your household income will also determine if you're eligible for EMA. Household income is the income of your parent(s) or carer(s) who live with you.

To qualify, households with one dependent child must be earning £24,421 per year or less, and households with more than one dependent child must be earning £26,884 or less, before tax.

# **Pi Day**

Pi or  $\pi$  is the special Mathematical number that is the circumference of a circle divided by the diameter. Regardless of how small or large the circle is the number is always the same, 3.14159265..... This is an irrational number which means it cannot be written as an exact fraction and therefore the decimal form never ends; the number becomes more exact as you add more decimal places but you can't write it without rounding.

This was 'discovered' by our S1 pupils on Pi Day (3.14 in USA or 14<sup>th</sup> March). While some S1 pupils were finding Pi by measuring circular objects, other S1 pupils were investigating Pi's many uses in Maths contexts.

On the same day, some of our S2 and S3 pupils worked through a relay where, in teams, they answer one question at time. When they have successfully found the answer, they get a mark and take the next question. S2 performed their relay on the Area and Perimeter of Circles, semi-circles and quarter-circles, where the S3 were asked about Arcs and Sectors of circles. Our feedback showed pupils thoroughly enjoyed the activities and found this a good way to revise.

### Maths Challenge Winners!

The Maths Challenge competition is organised by the UK Mathematics Trust, supported by the Institute and Faculty of Actuaries, for schools from across the UK and is designed to select and train teams to take part in the annual International Mathematical Olympiad.


The UK Mathematics Trust is a registered charity whose aim is to advance the education of children and young people in mathematics.

This year, 18 Turnbull pupils took part in the Intermediate Challenge and 21 pupils took part in the Junior Challenge. To recognize the highest performers in the Challenge, UKMT award the top-scoring 50% of participants Bronze, Silver and Gold certificates in the ratio 3:2:1. Students that are 'Best in Year' or 'Best in School' will also receive a badge to denote this on their certificates.

Our "Best in School" awards were won by Zihan Y in S3 and Aimie S in S1 who both achieved Silver Awards.

Best in Year in S2 were Christine L and Aidan M with Silver awards.

### **Primary Maths Challenge**

The Maths Dept spent three highly enjoyable afternoons in December visiting our associated primaries; St Helen's, St Matthew's and St Nicholas'. Every P7 pupil participated in the Maths Challenge where they were separated into teams and worked through a series of Maths puzzles, questions and practical activities. Each activity was

marked and scores were collated to find the two best teams from each school. The level of participation was excellent and we were very impressed with the standard of answers from all pupils involved.

Well done to all those who took part!


### **National Numeracy Day**

On the 22nd May Turnbull High School celebrated National Numeracy Day with a range of activities for our new S2 classes.

The aim of National Numeracy Day was to help people feel more confident about numbers and to recognise the presence and value of numbers in real life. We tackled both of those in the following ways:


#### **Number Puzzles**

Pupils worked individually or in pairs to solve number riddles and puzzles:



#### Number and Maths in Real life

We used the Barclays resources to investigate where Numeracy and Maths is used in real life. Pupils used case studies of individuals with different jobs, pastimes and responsibilities as the basis for discussion. They then chose the three areas of Maths they felt were most important in real life – with all pupils agreeing that Time, Money and Measurement were key.






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### **Improving your Numeracy Skills**

### 2024 Margaret Sinclair Pilgrimage

On the 25th April, a group of S1 pupils went on pilgrimage to St. Patrick's Church that is over 200 years old and is the shrine to a woman who could become Scotland's next canonised saint. The building is now a Catholic Church but it used to be a Protestant Church before they sold it to the very large Irish Catholic Community in the area, who at the time required a larger space to hold Mass. It was this Catholic community which began the parish football team which became Hibbs. They faced difficulty in breaking into the football scene at the time due to anti-Catholic and anti-Irish prejudice but quickly went



on to win the league. They wore the green hoops before Celtic did!

On arrival we received an introduction from a nice lady named Marion. Afterwards we went to a mini museum

which contained information and relics from/about Margaret's life.

The second activity was a tour of the large Church where we were taught the history of the statues and paintings which included ancient paintings of the 14 Stations of the Cross. We were also shown the large altar and learned about reverence and the Real Presence in the Eucharist.

The final indoor activity was watching a presentation that shows how the area around would have looked during Margaret's lifetime. This was followed by an informative talk

about the life and example of Margaret Sinclair given by Mr Hughes. Formerly the head of RE at Turnbull, Mr Hughes is now the education advisor to the Margaret Sinclair committee.

After a quick break and time to write our prayer petitions, Fr Gerrard Hatton offered Mass. Three of our group read the liturgy of the word and Father gave a homily about Margaret and St Mark. It worked out well that we visited on the feast of St Mark because we study his Gospel in S1 and lots of our learning matched up with what was said. Following Margaret's example of reverence for Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, we all knelt at the communion rail to receive Holy Communion. After Mass we returned to the rail to venerate a relic of Venerable Margaret.

Next thing was that we had a lunch break. After that Mr Hughes took us around to show us the streets and building Margaret grew up, even pointing out the flat her family would have lived in as well as her primary school. We also learned about an anti-Catholic speech given outside St Giles Kirk on the Royal Mile from which a mob of nearly a thousand set out to burn down St Patrick's Church. Inexplicably, undeterred by the 300 or so Catholic men who intended to defend the Church, the mob stopped at the top of the street and turned back. Some consider this to be down to the intercession of Venerable Margaret.

Finally, we were shown a small shop where we could purchase things such as rosaries. After the shop our bus arrived and we headed back to the school.
