Parking

As we begin a new term I would like to remind parents that the school car park should not be used for picking up or dropping off their children unless their child is ill or has a disability. Parents should use the drop off zone at the front of the school.

Allergies – Anaphylactic Shock

Many of our young people suffer from a range of allergies. Whilst it is not possible to give a guarantee that the school environment will be completely allergen free, we do request that young people do not bring nuts or food stuffs containing nuts into school. Please help us ensure that Turnbull High is a nut free zone.

Each young person affected by severe allergies must carry an inhaler, Piriton and Epipen with him/her at ALL times as appropriate. This is especially important should the young person be going out of school to attend an event or go on a trip. Medication required to combat allergic reactions and anaphylaxis should NOT be stored in the school office (unless a spare) or left with office staff.

Parents/Carers must ensure that their child comes to school with the correct medication in date, clearly labelled and with their son/daughter's name on it.

Parents/Carers should inform the PT Pastoral Care and School Nurse of any changes in medication as soon as this happens.

ONLINE SAFETY

As we begin a new term we have some words of advice from our School Liaison Officer, PC Gary Toner

"Mobile phones are a great way for children and young people to keep in contact with their parents, carers and friends, especially as they begin a new school year. However, issues may arise if our children and young people excitedly share their mobile phone number with other pupils in their new school year group and even wider, as they perhaps join 'WhatsApp' group chats or other social media group chats.

This can lead to your child or young person sharing their mobile phone number with a whole year group and being included in what could amount to over 100 school pupils on a single group chat! The reality of this is that they don't all know each other, they will all be from different backgrounds, they will all have different levels of online awareness and they will most likely be seeing messages, images and even video footage shared in the group which you, as a parent or carer, would not like them to see but which is out with your control. This situation can be difficult to manage and could be distressing in relation to what is read or seen. Coupled to this, peer pressure could lead to bullying.

WhatsApp is by far the most used messaging App although there are many other similar messaging Apps, and it allows users to send instant messages only to contacts that they have added to their WhatsApp account. Only people who have a WhatsApp account can send and receive messages through the app. Messages can be sent 'one to one' or within a 'group conversation' and for all messages sent, WhatsApp sends "read receipts" to tell sender if the message was delivered, read, seen or played. These settings can be changed, see the 'how to guide for parents' link below for more information. In relation to a group chat on any social media platform, even those as a parent or carer you are involved with, you have no control over what will be sent, seen or shared so it is worthwhile having a conversation with your child or young person about this.

We know peer pressure can lead to people of any age doing something they otherwise would not do, online or offline, so this awareness during your child or young persons' early years is very important.

0	Instagram	13+ Instagram is a picture and video sharing app. Teens signing up with a birth date indicating that they're under 16 will have private accounts by default, and those with public accounts will get a notification about the benefits of having a private account and how to switch. Photos shared in Instagram are public and may have location information unless privacy settings are adjusted. Also, it's possible to save other users' photos. In the app's Direct section, users can send private messages directly to other users, and a green status dot shows your friends you're active in the app (which could show people that you're active but not answering their messages) unless you turn it off in settings. Vanish Mode lets friends send messages that disappear after users leave the chat. The Reels feature lets user create TikTok-style short videos with visual effects and clips from popular music that they can share in their Instagram Stories or in their main feed. Users can use Remix to build on another user's Reels, like with TikTok Duets. Worth knowing instagram may push a narrative of a 'perfect world' to young people and they may feel pressured to post perfect, polished images of themselves. So watch out for who and what they are following.		
f	Facebook	13+ Facebook is a popular free social networking website that allows registered users to create profiles, upload photos and video, send messages and keep in touch with friends, family and colleagues. It is used not only by young people, but everyone.		
		Budding game developers may also appreciate the chance to express themselves and share their creations through Facebook's downloadable gaming platform and/or the gaming section of the site. Like the Reels feature in Instagram, Reels on Facebook allows users to create TikTok-style videos that are 30 seconds long. On the Safety page, parents can access directions about setting up a secure account, read about how to prevent online bullying, and get parenting tips around helping kids use social media responsibly. There's also a youth portal that's meant to help teens understand how		
		to use the site, control their information, and protect their privacy and safety. Because the privacy settings are layered and change often, it's important for users to check their settings and make sure they are sharing only with their intended audience.		
CALL-DUTY	Call of Duty	Call of Duty is a shooter video game which is played by everyone from the age of 13 and up despite the 18 rating.		
B	Snapchat	13+ SNAPCHAT is a social media platform used to share customisable photos, messages and short-form videos referred to as snaps which can disappear after 24 hours. Just because images and videos disappear within 24 hours, it doesn't mean that other users can't save them. Even though Snapchat tells you when another user screenshots your message. It does not consider secondary devices or video capturing software being used to record photos or videos.		
		Worth knowing Don't forget to put yourself in Ghost Mode. Also worth knowing is that there is currently no effective process to verify user age, which is a concern as friending users is easy and opens up direct contact to others. It's always worth checking that children know who their trusted adults are and that they can turn to them if something happens or they are worried.		
y	Twitter	Twitter is an online 'micro-biogging' social network founded in 2006. It is known for its short character limit of 280 characters, with the platform encouraging users to 'keep it brief'. It is also known for its use of hashtags, threads, and trending topics. Worth knowing Tweets can be geotagged, which could mean broadcasting an exact location or favourite place to hang out. All Tweets are public by default, meaning anyone can view, reply and retweet regardless of their age or beliefs. Which means inaccurate content can be shared in real time, which may distress younger audiences.

	Popjam	13+ A creative website for children and young people. You can share drawings, photos and audio messages with friends and others.		
0	Pinterest	13+ Pinterest is an online interactive pin board. You can create collections of pin boards using your own images and you can also re-pin things from other people.		
t	Tumbir	13+ Tumbir is a social networking site that lets you share text, photos, quotes, links, audio clips, slide shows and videos. You can customise your page and share other people's posts. You can also send private messages. Tumbir allows live streaming.		
0	Spotify	Spotify is a commercial music streaming service which is used by anyone who is into music but mainly 13+. You can listen to all genres of music on this app. Tracks with explicit lyrics and themes are available on Spotify, but these are usually indicated.		
You Tube	YouTube	18+ (younger with guardians permission) YouTube is a video sharing and social media platform. Videos can be commented on, liked and shared. Top tip Cyberbullying can occur through comments and age-inappropriate content may slip through moderators. Try out "YouTube Kids" – it's awesome.		
	Twitch	13+ Twitch is a live streaming video platform which allows creators to broadcast and users to watch content, usually about games, including eSports. Worth knowing Twitch streams are often live and are therefore difficult to moderate.		
a	ASKfm	13+ ASKfm is a social networking site where you can ask other people questions. You can choose to ask the question anonymously. You can easily block someone from asking you a question in the 'more' section of the app this even covers anonymous questions.		
	Minecraft	Minecraft is a sandbox game which can be played on all games consoles and mobile devices. It tends to be used mainly by children from 5-18.		
9	Omegie	18+ or 13+ with parent's permission. You log on with a webcam and microphone and are matched with another random user who you can either chat with or reject and move on. It's easy for kids to gain access to Omegle as the site doesn't require them to register as a user, or identify their age, meaning anyone is able to access the site. There's a high risk that your child will come across explicit sexual content and bad language.		
(A)	Clash of Clans	13+ A combat game where players build their own armies (clans) and battle other armies from around the world. You can join forces with other armies or battle against others on your own.		
ROBLEX	Roblox	12+ However younger children do play using the extra setting to help them keep safe. Roblox is the ultimate virtual universe that lets you play, create, and be anything you can imagine. All Roblox accounts display the age bracket in the menu and in-game. Age is never shown to other players.		
A A	Fortnite Battle Royale	13+ A multiplayer shooting game. Very addictive and each match can last up to 20 minutes. Up to 100 players play against each other in solo, duo, or up to four-player squads to see who can survive the longest against each other in an ever-shrinking map. The game has a cartoonish style, and the violence, while persistent, isn't bloody or particularly gory, even though you're using melee weapons and firearms to eliminate opponents. The game does push players to make additional in-game purchases to acquire many cosmetic items, objects, and celebratory animations, though they're not necessarily required to play. While there isn't any profanity in the game dialogue, its online nature could expose younger players to inappropriate language from random strangers in voice or on-screen text chat.

		13+ Reddit is a community-based forum where people write posts covering different topics, which others can then comment on. The more popular something, the higher up it appears on the website. Beware: experts regard this as a high risk forum for young people. Worth knowing There are no age verification systems, so can be easily bypassed to view inappropriate content.		
m	Discord	13+ An instant messaging social platform in which people enter servers so they are part of a group – used a lot in gaming communities. Watch out for Inappropriate/adult content which is unsuitable for younger users.		
9	Steam	13+ Steam is an entertainment platform which lets you play games and create your own in- game content. You can also chat to other members of the community through groups, clans or in-game chat features. Steam allows live streaming.		
Ϋ́	TikTok	13+ TikTok is a video-sharing social media app which lets you create, view and download looping 15-second clips. Enable Family Pairing – which lets you link your account to your child's through your mobile so that you can control your child's settings remotely, including limiting screen time, managing messages and blocking a lot of age inappropriate content. Worth knowing – visit the digital wellbeing sections and Safety Centre.		
(Q)	WhatsApp	16+ WhatsApp is an instant messaging app which lets you send messages, images and videos in one-to-one and group chats with your contacts. You can choose to share your live location for up to eight hours with one contact or a group. A number of settings can be changed (and are recommended) to enable improved privacy and safety over the default information. Worth knowing Turn your live location off – everything can be found in your settings. Beware of scams and malware.		
APEX	Apex Legends 13+ Apex Legends continues to be one of the best games of 2022, It's free to play but there are many opportunities for in-game spend used to buy Apex Coins, the main form of in-game currency. Apex Legends is a multi-player battle royale video game that's sim Fortnite. It's a first-person shooter based on the sci-fi frontier world although it doesn't continue those stories. Instead, it drops 20 squal to a map to compete to be the last team standing. Each player on a one of eight characters (called 'Legends' to play, each with a different abilities. 0	BBC Own it 4+ The BBC Own it app is an online safety and wellbeing app for young p them keep track of how they're feeling, build online skills and access supp they might face online. It also includes a keyboard that responds to what t might prompt users to think before sending a message or direct them to h they're upset. The app is private and none of the data is shared with anyb			



Online safety: top tips

Going online is a huge part of most young people's lives so it's important to talk to them about online safety. Here's our tips to get you started.



Chat to them about what they like to do online

The best way to find out what your child is doing online is to talk to them and have regular conversations so that online safety is part of everyday discussion. Ask them open-ended questions like 'What's your favourite game or app to play on?'.

- Listen to what they have to say and show an interest.
 They could give you a demo of their favourite app or show you their favourite YouTube or TikTok account.
- They will probably be able to teach you things you don't know! This will also give you an opportunity to chat about any safety settings they might already have in place.
- Regular conversations with your child will encourage them to come to you if they ever need support or advice.

Talk about who they are in contact with online

There are lots of different ways that children can talk to people online – messaging apps, on social media, and less obvious ways such as chat on online games. Talk to your child about who they are talking to and what they are sharing with them.

- Use settings to help limit who can contact your child.
- Remind your child that they shouldn't share personal information with people they don't know online.
- Let your child know they can come to you or another trusted adult if any conversation makes them feel uncomfortable.

Make sure to talk to your child first before implementing any

new settings and explain to them how they help to keep them safe.

Help manage what they see and do online

Parental controls and privacy settings can help you manage how your child spends time online and help to keep them safe.

- Device settings manage things like location sharing, screen time and in-app purchases. Most tech
 and gaming companies have dedicated pages to support with setting these up.
- App or game settings in-app tools that can help to keep your child's account private and manage who they're talking to. You can normally find information on these in account settings or directly on the platforms website.
- Mobile or network provider settings help to manage browsing access and stop your child from visiting inappropriate sites or downloading apps that aren't suitable. Contact your mobile or broadband provider for more information about setting this up.

Remember it's ok to ask for help!

Remember you don't have to be an online safety expert – that's our job! We're here to help, with resources and advice to help support you and your child.

If your child asks you a question you don't know the answer to, or speaks to you about a negative experience they had online, here are some of things you could do:



Parents Portal: what is it and how do I access it?



Last year, East Dunbartonshire Council changed the way schools and families communicate with each other through the introduction of a new online service called parentsportal.scot.

This is an online portal designed to be a one-stop shop for a number of school-related activities and will create a new digital relationship between home and school. Through time, it is hoped this portal will replace the traditional 'schoolbag run' and make communicating with one another easier and more efficient.

At the heart of the system is an online account created by the Scottish Government called **myaccount**. This is a secure method of accessing **parentsportal.scot** which will allow you to link to your child and carry out the following tasks using a single sign-on approach:

- Make online payments (cashless catering)
- Report an absence
- View pupils' attendance
- View pupils' timetable
- View trips and events
- View school holidays
- View school twitter feed
- Book appointments for Parents' Evenings
- Update contact details
- Receive notices from the school
- Apply for Young Persons' Free Bus Travel Scheme (for 5-10 year olds)
- Complete the annual data check (that's when we check emergency contacts etc).

Before you can access the many features parentsportal.scot has to offer, you **must** first have a **myaccount**. If you do not already have an account, there are instructions in the frequently asked questions (FAQs) below on how to set one up. Once you have done this you can then **register** for **parentsportal.scot**. Please follow the instructions in the FAQs to do this.

Thank you for your continued partnership with us in ensuring that your child's attendance is maximised and that the reason for any absence is recorded promptly and accurately.

Please find below a reminder of the procedures for advising the school of your child's absence.

As you will be aware, if you do not inform us that your child is going to be absent, we will take action to find your child.

This will involve:

- contacting you and, where necessary, your emergency contact person(s).
- If we are not able to contact you:
 - we will ask the school's Home Link Officer (Attendance Officer) to visit your home.
 - we may also contact the Police and/or Social Work where a child's whereabouts are unknown and where we cannot establish the reason for absence.

We require parents and carers to let us know of any absence before the start of the school day using the Parents Portal.

If an absence is planned, you can tell us of this in advance using the Portal. We encourage all parents and carers to report absences through the Parents Portal (parentsportal.scot) rather than by email or telephone.



Register for myaccount

If you have not already registered, the Parents Portal can be accessed via the Scottish Government on line account called **myaccount**. This is a secure method of accessing parentsportal.scot which will allow you to link to your child and carry out a range of tasks, including reporting absences, using a single sign-on approach.

ATTENDANCE

Every School Day Counts

In this edition of the Turnbull Times, we are revisiting the importance of attendance at school in supporting every young person's wellbeing, learning and options for the future. We all have responsibilities to ensure that young people achieve their full potential in life. The 1980 Education Act (Scotland) (Section 30) lays a duty on every parent of a child of 'school age' to ensure that their child attends school regularly.

If your son or daughter is experiencing difficulties attending school, the sooner you inform us of this, the quicker we can work together to remedy this.

Every School Day Counts: Parents and Carers

Attendance Advice for Parents and Carers

- Make sure your son/daughter attends every day. Every missed day is a day without teacher input and
 expertise. It is a fact that greater attendance equals greater attainment. If your child misses one day of
 school a week, this becomes a year missed over the course of five years. Every day counts!
- Excellent punctuality is essential and expected. The school day begins at 9am prompt and all students are expected to arrive in good time for school starting.
- Time management arriving on time for the start of school and throughout the school day for each new lesson is crucial to achieving full academic potential and skills for life.
- Attendance and punctuality are important aspects of the references we provide for employers, further and higher education.

We ask that parents and carers support us by:

- Ensuring a good sleep habit/readiness for school routine
- Getting your son/daughter up in plenty of time to eat breakfast, be ready and prepared for school
- Helping your son/daughter to be organised for the day by preparing school bags, equipment and kit the evening before
- Making sure you leave in plenty of time to manage traffic and congestion if dropping your son/daughter at school
- Telephoning your son/daughter to make sure they are ready to leave on time if you leave the house before them
- Making every effort for appointments to be made outwith the school day
- Making every effort for holidays to be taken outwith school term¹
- Monitoring your son/daughter's punctuality and attendance for patterns
- Tell us in advance of absence or latecoming if you can.

¹EDC policy - Family holidays are regarded as authorised absence where prior agreement from the school has been obtained and where it is judged the holiday is important to the wellbeing and cohesion of the family, following serious or terminal illness, bereavement or other traumatic events.

Every School Day Counts: School

If your child is late, you will receive a text message from the school advising of this. We will also contact you if your child is absent and we have not had any communication about this from you. This will involve contacting you and, where necessary, your emergency contact person(s).

If these actions are not successful, the school will ask our Attendance Officer to visit your home on the day of absence. In some exceptional circumstances, where the school believes your child could be at risk of harm, contact will be made with the Police and/or Social Work.

If you are unaware of your child's absence, you should contact the school immediately.

Attendance Concerns


Where there are concerns about punctuality and/or patterns of non-attendance, your child's PT Pastoral Care will be proactive in discussing these with you. If we have concerns, we will:

- Speak to your child about this
- Telephone you to discuss this concern and agree what needs to be done to improve this
- We will set a timescale within which punctuality and/or attendance should improve
- We will monitor this and contact you again to review progress
- We will support your child in school with this.

If no improvement, we will:

- Telephone you to discuss the reasons behind this
- Agree supports, actions and timescales for punctuality/attendance to improve and send the school's Attendance Officer to visit you at home as required
- Send you a letter of concern and invite you into school to discuss
- At the meeting, agree a timescale for supports, actions and timescales for punctuality/attendance to improve
- Refer our concerns on to the school's Attendance Council
- Refer on to other agencies for support.

Summary

Our partnership with you is even more important than ever. Please do not wait to raise any concerns about your child's attendance, learning or wellbeing with us. We understand that some young people have 'off days' but it is important to keep a positive attendance going. This builds resilience and progression in learning.

We will celebrate your child's positive school attendance and work with you to make good attendance, good punctuality and good learning habits a skill for life.

The damaging effect of poor attendance on a young person's learning and wellbeing can be seen below.

If a child has 90% attendance, they will have the equivalent of

- ½ a day off per week
- 18 days off per year
- 247 days off over their school career of 12 academic years, equivalent to over 1 year of lost education.

Participation in School Reward Trips



UNIFORM POLICY: DRESS FOR SUCCESS

Our dress code aims to provide a cost-effective way for pupils to show that they are proud to belong to our school community. Wearing uniform reflects a positive attitude to learning and removes any peer pressure to wear expensive brand names. Wearing uniform also promotes equality and inclusion. We continue to expect the highest possible standards for our Turnbull school uniform.

BLAZER

The school blazer complete with embroidered badge is compulsory for ALL pupils. There are two styles of blazer available, fitted or traditional design, for both boys and girls.

Plain black jackets, **no logos or colours**, may be worn over the blazer and removed upon arrival at school.

SCHOOL SHIRTS/BLOUSES

Only blue school shirts/ blouses that can be fastened to the top are acceptable. These should be traditional school wear clothing.

TIES

- √ S1-S3 striped
- ✓ S4-S5 plain blue
- √ S6 plain blue with bar
- ✓ The school tie should be full length when worn.

SKIRTS

- ✓ Smart, formal school skirts must be of an appropriate length, coming to just above the knee.
- ✓ Skirts must be black.

Dresses, pinafores and lycra skirts are **NOT** acceptable.

TROUSERS

- ✓ School trousers must be black, formal and tailored.
- ✓ If belts are worn with trousers these should be plain black with small buckle.
- ✓ Shirts must be worn tucked into trousers.

All other forms of trouser are **NOT acceptable**:

- * shorter length
- ★ skinny- fit
- × leggings
- × jeans
- × chinos
- **x** shorts
- × culottes

CARDIGANS/JUMPERS

- ✓ Black school cardigans must be fitted and be of an appropriate length
- ✓ Only plain black V- neck jumpers must be worn
- Long cardigans and tank tops **NOT acceptable**
- crew neck jumpers and hoodies are **NOT acceptable**

TIGHTS/SOCKS

Black tights should be worn. They should be plain without any pattern. Black knee high socks and short socks must be plain.

FOOTWEAR

- Black, formal school shoes or plain black trainers which appear similar to school shoes must be worn.
- Black boots must be robust and in keeping with the formal dress code
- ALL other types of fashion footwear are **NOT** acceptable eg Converse etc

PE KIT

Plain T- shirt or Turnbull PE top must be worn with shorts / plain sportswear trousers. Leggings are allowed for girls. Neutral colours are fine it need not be black.

Please take note of the following guidelines for your young person's PE kit:

- **Full Change of Clothing**: Students must bring a full change of top, bottoms, and footwear specifically for PE. This helps maintain hygiene and ensures they are dressed appropriately for class.
- **Tops**: Crop tops, belly tops, or any top that exposes the midriff are not permitted. Students should wear a full-length t-shirt or sports top.
- **Bottoms**: Students should wear appropriate sports shorts, leggings, or tracksuit bottoms. These should be suitable for physical activity and the weather.
- **Footwear**: Proper sports trainers are required for PE. Please ensure your child is wearing footwear that provides adequate support. **Crocs, sandals, or any open-toed shoes are not appropriate** for PE activities.
- **Team Colours**: To maintain a neutral and inclusive environment, we ask that students do not wear clothing with football colours or logos from any team.
- Weather-Appropriate Gear: On days with wet or cold weather, please provide your child with a
 waterproof jacket or other appropriate outerwear. This will help them stay dry and comfortable during
 outdoor activities.'
- **Jewellery**: No Jewellery should be worn during PE, with particular reference to hooped earrings, bracelets and necklaces that are on show as they can be easily damaged, lost or cause harm to the wearer and classmates.

We appreciate that this information is prescriptive. This is to ensure that there is no ambiguity as to what is acceptable with regard to school uniform. The school supplier, Baru, provides a very cost effective package for our school. Uniform may also be purchased from reputable stores, or supermarkets which also provide an appropriate range of school wear. High Street fashion retailers do not provide appropriate Turnbull High school uniform. If you are in any doubt please contact the school before purchasing.

Our Community Hub offers recycled uniform items to support all pupils in wearing full school uniform every day. Pupils should go to the Community Hub between 8.45am and 9am to collect required items - stationery, toiletries etc are also available free of charge.

The Successful Learner Award presented to the highest attaining student in each subject. This award recognises:

- Enthusiasm and motivation for learning

- Commitment to participating fully in learning
- Respect for others
- Resilience
- Ability to work in partnership with others as part of a team.

The final award recognises students who have made a positive **Contribution to the Life and Ethos of the School**. This includes young people who have:

- Taken up opportunities to participate responsibility in decision-making
- Contributed as leaders and role models
- Offered support and service to others, putting the values of our school community into practice.



As you are aware, we received a glowing report from HMI recently where they highlighted our Building Learning Power (BLP) initiative as one of our strengths. We are continuing our focus to improve pupil resilience by enhancing awareness and use of BLP techniques in all classes.

So far, every teacher has completed the course on BLP techniques and purpose. We then, as a school staff, chose the techniques we felt were most effective and created visuals for these. By recruiting our BLP ambassadors from year groups across the school, we were also able to establish which techniques pupils found helpful.

BLP encourages teachers to allow pupils to take more initiative in their learning and studying both in class and at home. By including techniques such as C3B4me (try using at least 3 resources such as brain, books, buddy before asking the teacher) or thinking time/no hands up (allowing all pupils time to process and produce a response rather than the quickest in the class), we are encouraging all pupils to be as engaged and responsible for their own learning as possible. BLP also helps teachers give pupils the best ways to revise with 'Flashback Fridays', mind mapping, etc being used in many classes.

For the last two years, our senior ambassadors have presented lessons on the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child in which they used and highlighted BLP techniques being used throughout the school. This allowed pupils to recognise the good work happening in their classes as teachers encourage them to take more responsibility.

We would now like to extend this knowledge to our parent forum. You will soon receive an invitation to join us for an information session on BLP where we will explain in more detail how and why we feel this is beneficial to our pupils.

Here's what two of our ambassadors have to say:

"BLP has helped both of us, both in our studies and developing interpersonal skills that we will use for the rest of our lives. In our studies, BLP has made us more resilient learners who can weather difficulties and overcome them. We really enjoyed being BLP ambassadors as we had numerous opportunities to improve our communication skills by presenting Building Learning Power PowerPoints in front of pupils at assemblies and we improved our leadership skills by leading PSE classes, where we taught students more about UNCRC. We both believe that being able to talk to a wide range of students in different year groups through BLP was beneficial as it gave us the opportunity to see the world through different eyes. We would both recommend becoming a BLP ambassador as, although talking in front of others can be scary, it is an amazing experience and opportunity to better yourself.

BLP has taught us a lot of things like how to become a more independent pupil. We both feel more comfortable and confident doing work on our own, and asking a teacher for help has now become a last resort. We now really feel like active participants in our learning which we know will better prepare us for university where independent learning is prioritised"


