SQA Exam Diet 2025

The SQA Exam diet for 2025 is almost complete. Results Day is Tuesday 5th August. MySQA is SQA's online and text results service allowing candidates to receive their results from 8am on results day. It's also a helpful resource to check the personal information SQA holds for each candidate, including SQA qualifications previously achieved.

To register for MySQA, pupils will need their Scottish Candidate Number (SCN) and a valid email address. They can find their SCN on their SCN card issued prior to study leave or a previous SQA certificate. Anyone who cannot find their SCN should contact their Pastoral Care teacher or year head. Uniform

Turnbull High School has been renowned for our excellent standard of uniform over many years, however, I am disappointed to report that there has been a dip in this standard.

A number of students are wearing leggings, cropped tops and branded footwear to school on a regular basis. These do not conform to our agreed uniform policy and I would ask for parental support in ensuring these items are not worn to school.

There has also been a drop in the number of pupils wearing a school blazer. This is an important part of our uniform and I ask that you encourage your son/daughter to wear their school blazer travelling to school and moving around the school.

Your support in restoring our excellent uniform standard is greatly appreciated. We can only achieve this with your support as parents. When purchasing uniform for session 25/26 I would ask that you please be cognisant of this dress code and support us in returning to our excellent standards.


March Update

As part of our school almsgiving, the RE department hosted a sponsored silence during which BGE pupils had to keep shtum for a whole period!



S1 Pilgrimage 2025








Pupils enjoyed a presentation from the dedicated team of volunteers about this ordinary girl who is on the path to sainthood. Learning about the joys and sufferings of an ordinary live at the turn of the century, our young people gained a deeper appreciation of what it means to be a disciple of Jesus- not being boring and cut off, and not necessarily by receiving great revelations from God, but through the ordinary things of life, done with love for God and others.









After a picnic in the sun, we walked to Blackfriars Street where venerable Margaret used to live and on our return, the chairman of the canonisation committee gave a talk on the process by which a person is declared a saint.





The young people were perhaps the most respectful, inquisitive and affable group that we have every taken on this trip.

They were an absolute credit to the school and to their families. We hope that they were inspired to consider how they might invite God into their everyday life, to love Him in the Blessed Sacrament and to discover a life of prayer.



Young Carers' Action Day – 2025

On Wednesday, March 12th, Turnbull High School proudly celebrated *Young Carers Action Day* by offering a well-deserved break to some of its most hardworking and selfless pupils – its young carers.

To mark the national awareness day, young carers at the school were given the opportunity to take part in specially arranged activities aimed at promoting wellbeing and relaxation. Pupils could choose from a range of options, from calm, peaceful spaces to physical activities. Refreshments, including drinks and snacks, were provided throughout the morning.

The event also gave pupils the chance to unwind, chat with others in similar situations, and forge new friendships. A highlight of the day was seeing several S1 students meet peers from other year groups and begin building a support network that will last well beyond the day itself. For some, it was also the first time they received their official *Young Carers card*, a small but powerful symbol of recognition for their vital role at home.

Young Carers Action Day is an annual event that shines a spotlight on the incredible contributions of young people who help care for family members. Turnbull High School's recognition of this important day underlines its ongoing commitment to supporting the mental health, wellbeing, and social inclusion of all pupils.

Mrs McBride and Mrs Kerr expressed their pride in the school's young carers, many of whom balance their studies with significant responsibilities at home. "It's essential that these students know they're seen, supported, and celebrated." Mrs Kerr said.

UNIFORM POLICY: DRESS FOR SUCCESS

Our dress code aims to provide a cost-effective way for pupils to show that they are proud to belong to our school community. Wearing uniform reflects a positive attitude to learning and removes any peer pressure to wear expensive brand names. Wearing uniform also promotes equality and inclusion. We continue to expect the highest possible standards for our Turnbull school uniform.

BLAZER

The school blazer complete with embroidered badge is compulsory for ALL pupils. There are two styles of blazer available, fitted or traditional design, for both boys and girls.

Plain black jackets, no logos or colours, may be worn over the blazer and removed upon arrival at school.

SCHOOL SHIRTS/BLOUSES

Only blue school shirts/ blouses that can be fastened to the top are acceptable. These should be traditional school wear clothing.

TIES

- √ S1-S3 striped
- ✓ S4-S5 plain blue
- √ S6 plain blue with bar
- ✓ The school tie should be full length when worn.

SKIRTS

- ✓ Smart, formal school skirts must be of an appropriate length, coming to just above the knee.
- ✓ Skirts must be black.

Dresses, pinafores and lycra skirts are **NOT** acceptable.

TROUSERS

- ✓ School trousers must be black, formal and tailored.
- ✓ If belts are worn with trousers these should be plain black with small buckle.
- ✓ Shirts must be worn tucked into trousers.

All other forms of trouser are **NOT acceptable**:

- * shorter length
- ★ skinny- fit
- ✗ leggings
- × jeans
- × chinos
- **x** shorts
- culottes

UNIFORM POLICY: DRESS FOR SUCCESS

CARDIGANS/JUMPERS

- ✓ Black school cardigans must be fitted and be of an appropriate length
- ✓ Only plain black V- neck jumpers must be worn
- Long cardigans and tank tops **NOT acceptable**
- crew neck jumpers and hoodies are **NOT acceptable**

TIGHTS/SOCKS

Black tights should be worn. They should be plain without any pattern. Black knee high socks and short socks must be plain.

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FOOTWEAR

- Black, formal school shoes or plain black trainers which appear similar to school shoes must be worn.
- Black boots must be robust and in keeping with the formal dress code
- ALL other types of fashion footwear are **NOT** acceptable eg Converse etc

PE KIT

Plain T- shirt or Turnbull PE top must be worn with shorts / plain sportswear trousers. Leggings are allowed for girls. Neutral colours are fine it need not be black.

Please take note of the following guidelines for your young person's PE kit:

- **Full Change of Clothing**: Students must bring a full change of top, bottoms, and footwear specifically for PE. This helps maintain hygiene and ensures they are dressed appropriately for class.
- **Tops**: Crop tops, belly tops, or any top that exposes the midriff are not permitted. Students should wear a full-length t-shirt or sports top.
- **Bottoms**: Students should wear appropriate sports shorts, leggings, or tracksuit bottoms. These should be suitable for physical activity and the weather.
- **Footwear**: Proper sports trainers are required for PE. Please ensure your child is wearing footwear that provides adequate support. **Crocs, sandals, or any open-toed shoes are not appropriate** for PE activities.
- **Team Colours**: To maintain a neutral and inclusive environment, we ask that students do not wear clothing with football colours or logos from any team.
- Weather-Appropriate Gear: On days with wet or cold weather, please provide your child with a
 waterproof jacket or other appropriate outerwear. This will help them stay dry and comfortable during
 outdoor activities.'
- **Jewellery**: No Jewellery should be worn during PE, with particular reference to hooped earrings, bracelets and necklaces that are on show as they can be easily damaged, lost or cause harm to the wearer and classmates.

We appreciate that this information is prescriptive. This is to ensure that there is no ambiguity as to what is acceptable with regard to school uniform. The school supplier, Baru, provides a very cost effective package for our school. Uniform may also be purchased from reputable stores, or supermarkets which also provide an appropriate range of school wear. High Street fashion retailers do not provide appropriate Turnbull High school uniform. If you are in any doubt please contact the school before purchasing.

Our Community Hub offers recycled uniform items to support all pupils in wearing full school uniform every day. Pupils should go to the Community Hub between 8.45am and 9am to collect required items - stationery, toiletries etc are also available free of charge.

Jesus our Teacher, in your love for us, help us to develop our own talents so that we may become like you and lead lives of goodness.


