### School Contact

We know that many parents say that secondary schools can be confusing and some parents report that they do not know who they should contact for a particular reason. Within Turnbull High School we operate a simple system whereby the PT Pastoral Care should be the point of contact for all new enquiries. It is important that you contact the school if you have any issues, questions or concerns. Please do not wait, do this as soon as possible so we can work together to resolve matters.

Unless there is a pre-existing arrangement or direct communication with a member of staff please contact the PT Pastoral Care in the first instance. This can be done by contacting the school office and giving the name and house group for your child. The PT Pastoral Care will be delighted to help you.

Parents are also advised that pupils do not have access to their mobile phones during class. If you wish to contact your son/daughter during the school day, we recommend that contact is made via the school office.

### Parking

As we begin a new term I would like to remind parents that the school car park should not be used for picking up or dropping off their children unless their child is ill or has a disability. Parents should use the drop off zone at the front of the school.

Parents are also asked not to park in the disabled bays unless they are displaying a disabled badge. There have been occasions recently when disabled parents / visitors have not been able to access these bays due to inconsiderate parking.

In the interests of safety parents should also not park on the zigzag lines outside the school, stop at areas marked no parking or park across driveway entrances causing inconvenience to others. Parents may find it easier to meet their children a short distance from the school to help minimise congestion in the surrounding area.

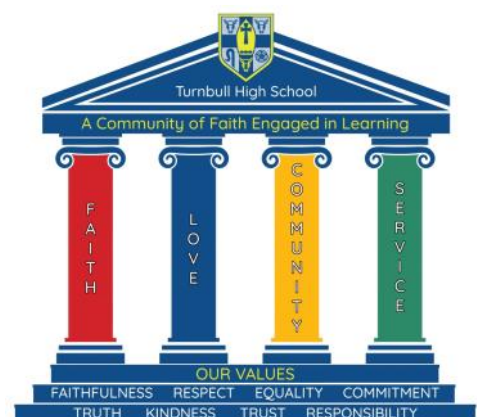
### Mid Term Holiday

# CHEMISTRY DEPARTMENT

## Chemistry Café: From Classroom to Catalysis

On the 17<sup>th</sup> of September, the Chemistry department hosted a special edition of Chemistry Café, welcoming back former pupil Joseph Scarse for an inspiring talk that bridged the gap between school science and cutting-edge university research.

Now in his third year studying Chemistry at the University of Strathclyde, Joseph returned to share his journey - from accidentally (slightly) flooding the lab in Advanced Higher to conducting real-world research in a university lab. His summer project focused on catalysis, a field that explores how chemical reactions can be sped up using special substances. This is particularly important in his field of interest, Drug Discovery, as new medicines can be synthesised very efficiently using catalysts compared to traditional means.

Students were captivated by his stories of lab work, unexpected colour changes, and the thrill of discovery. "It was eye-opening to see how chemistry applies to solving global challenges," said one S6 pupil. Jamie also offered practical advice on making the most of the university experience, managing workload, and staying curious.

Joseph also gave tailored talks to the Higher and Advanced Higher classes about how the Chemistry they are currently learning about links with current and innovative university research.

Chemistry Café proved once again that science isn't just about textbooks—it's about exploration, innovation, and the people who dare to ask "what if?" We're grateful to Joseph for reminding us that the Periodic Table is just the beginning.

### Newton Flight Academy

Once again this year we took the S3 Physicists who are staying on into S4 Physics to the Flight Academy at the Science Centre. This is always a popular trip with real life applications for their learning. We started off with thinking about what makes a plane fly and then some mathematical navigation challenges.



All 26 pupils got the opportunity to be trained on an actual flight simulator that pilots learn on and are then sent on a rescue mission in Sweden. They have to take turns on the simulators so they also have time to visit the exhibits in the main hall.

Split over two different days it is a memorable part of the Physics Calendar.

### National 4 RMPS

Our S3 pupils have been working away on their National 4 RMPS within RE lessons. This is the first year of implementing the qualification at this level. By introducing assessments of our existing RERC courses, all pupils will have the opportunity to achieve a full National 4 by the end of S4. This recognises the quality of learning that our young people have always undertaken in RE.

### S1 Retreat

In preparation for the S1 Welcome Mass, S1 pupils completed their induction with their S1 retreat. The retreat comprised of games, learning and prayer that helped the young people to reflect on our school Values and Virtues.

### S3 Vocations Day

Our annual S3 Vocations Day took place on the 25th of September. Our young people participated in discussion groups with clergy and a religious sister who have served the church in many different ways. From a young curate to a retired priest who served as a missionary in Africa, a musician and liturgist to one of the Sisters of the Gospel of Life, pupils entered into conversation about what it means to be a disciple of Jesus and to follow one's vocation.

We managed to secure some funding through the Powering the Future scheme which involved some prior engagement which explored pupil attitudes to Carbon Capture and the need for changing our methods of energy production. During our visit we spent time exploring the Energy floor which demonstrates different methods of energy production in Scotland.

We also watched a film about the melting Glaciers due to Climate Change and the irreversible loss of fresh water sources.

In addition we also visited the Planetarium giving a fresh perspective of our place in the Universe. We are a designated Space School with Bronze status and want to also encourage everyone to explore our Solar System and beyond.

As you can see it was an action packed day, with lots to inspire our pupils to be problem solvers for the future.

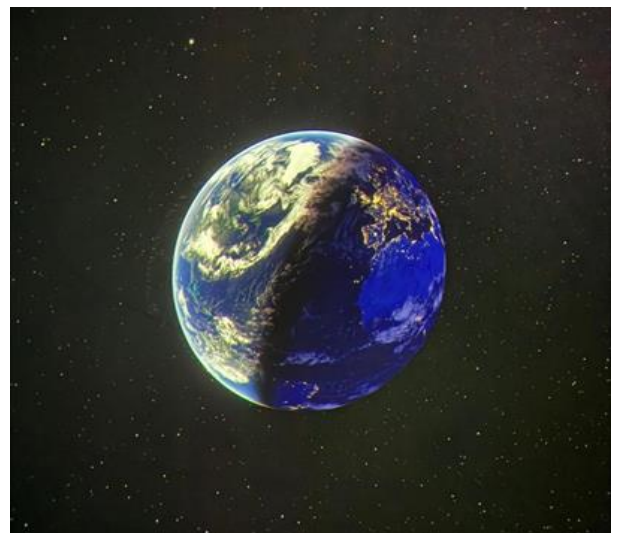

## UNIFORM POLICY :

### DRESS FOR SUCCESS

Our dress code aims to provide a cost-effective way for pupils to show that they are proud to belong to our school community. Wearing uniform reflects a positive attitude to learning and removes any peer pressure to wear expensive brand names. Wearing uniform also promotes equality and inclusion. We continue to expect the highest possible standards for our Turnbull school uniform.

#### BLAZER

The school blazer complete with embroidered badge is compulsory for ALL pupils. There are two styles of blazer available, fitted or traditional design, for both boys and girls.

Plain black jackets, **no logos or colours**, may be worn over the blazer and removed upon arrival at school.

#### SCHOOL SHIRTS/BLOUSES

Only blue school shirts/ blouses that can be fastened to the top are acceptable. These should be traditional school wear clothing.

**CARDIGANS/JUMPERS**

✓ Black school cardigans must be fitted and be of an appropriate length	✗ Long cardigans and tank tops <b>NOT acceptable</b>
✓ Only plain black V- neck jumpers must be worn	✗ crew neck jumpers and hoodies are <b>NOT acceptable</b>

**TIGHTS/SOCKS**

Black tights should be worn. They should be plain without any pattern. Black knee high socks and short socks must be plain.

**FOOTWEAR**

✓ Black, formal school shoes or plain black trainers which appear similar to school shoes must be worn.	✗ ALL other types of fashion footwear are <b>NOT acceptable</b> eg Converse etc
✓ Black boots must be robust and in keeping with the formal dress code	

**PE KIT**

Plain T- shirt or Turnbull PE top must be worn with shorts / plain sportswear trousers. Leggings are allowed for girls. Neutral colours are fine it need not be black.

**Please take note of the following guidelines for your young person's PE kit:**

- **Full Change of Clothing:** Students must bring a full change of top, bottoms, and footwear specifically for PE. This helps maintain hygiene and ensures they are dressed appropriately for class.
- **Tops:** Crop tops, belly tops, or any top that exposes the midriff are not permitted. Students should wear a full-length t-shirt or sports top.
- **Bottoms:** Students should wear appropriate sports shorts, leggings, or tracksuit bottoms. These should be suitable for physical activity and the weather.
- **Footwear:** Proper sports trainers are required for PE. Please ensure your child is wearing footwear that provides adequate support. **\*\*Crocs, sandals, or any open-toed shoes are not appropriate\*\*** for PE activities.
- **Team Colours:** To maintain a neutral and inclusive environment, we ask that students do not wear clothing with football colours or logos from any team.
- **Weather-Appropriate Gear:** On days with wet or cold weather, please provide your child with a waterproof jacket or other appropriate outerwear. This will help them stay dry and comfortable during outdoor activities.'
- **Jewellery:** No Jewellery should be worn during PE, with particular reference to hooped earrings, bracelets and necklaces that are on show as they can be easily damaged, lost or cause harm to the wearer and classmates.

We appreciate that this information is prescriptive. This is to ensure that there is no ambiguity as to what is acceptable with regard to school uniform. The school supplier, Baru, provides a very cost effective package for our school. Uniform may also be purchased from reputable stores, or supermarkets which also provide an appropriate range of school wear. High Street fashion retailers do not provide appropriate Turnbull High school uniform. If you are in any doubt please contact the school before purchasing.

Our Community Hub offers recycled uniform items to support all pupils in wearing full school uniform every day. Pupils should go to the Community Hub between 8.45am and 9am to collect required items - stationery, toiletries etc are also available free of charge.
